A Note From Phillip, a Volunteer:

My favorite part of being a volunteer at the Labor Resource Center is seeing the familiar faces as they walk in the door every day. I love the wide-eyed grins which accompany recognition. One of my favorite smiling faces is that of *el hombre de dos*



nombres (the man with two names) as I secretly call him. I have only spoken with him three times, but in my mind I have already turned him into a mysterious cowboy in the ilk of those characters from old Clint Eastwood Westerns. Unfortunately, he comes across as very non cowboy-like. I remember when he told me about how people teased him about having two first names. El hombre de dos nombres is a great example of how volunteering at the center is all about the smiles.

Five years ago, I was president of a recreational league. My friend asked me how I got elected. I told him that all you have to do is notice people and make them feel important. Smile at them, give them a pat on the shoulder, and let them know that you see them. Imagine how important it is to not have people look past you when you are alone, in unfamiliar territory, and a thousand miles away from your family. There are several excellent ways to offer time as a volunteer at the Labor Resource Center. A volunteer can teach English as a Second Language, help with administrative work, or offer skills knowledge like how to install drywall. However, the first step is to make the laborers feel a little more at home by giving them a familiar face when they walk in the door.
